**No. 168. THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO 1946.**

**ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 2245**

**MADE UNDER SECTION 52.**

**WINSTER,**  
*Governor.*

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1946, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Import Duty (Prefabricated Houses) Exemption Order, 1947.

2. In this Order—

“prefabricated house” means a house of which the structural frame, floors, ceilings, roofs, walls and external and internal finishings and fittings (including cupboards, beds, tables, benches and electrical, sanitary, heating, cooling, cooking and refrigerating apparatus) are fabricated in a factory and prepared for rapid assembly and erection, previous to their delivery to the site.

3. Every municipal corporation may import one prefabricated house free of import duty for use by the importing corporation as specimen for demonstration purposes:

Provided that if at any time any municipal corporation shall sell or otherwise divest itself of the ownership of any prefabricated house imported by it as hereinbefore provided, such corporation shall pay an import duty in respect of such house at the rate of 10% on the purchase price thereof.

4. This Order shall cease to apply to any particular corporation upon the importation by such corporation of the one prefabricated house which such corporation is entitled to import free of import duty under the provisions of this Order:

Provided that nothing in this clause contained shall affect the operation of the proviso to clause 3 as hereinbefore.
