1. This Law may be cited as the Pensions (Amendment) Law, 1924, and shall be read as one with the Pensions Law, 1905, (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Law), and the Principal Law and this Law may together be cited as the Pensions Laws, 1905 and 1924.

Short title.

2. The Second Schedule, section 21, of the Principal Law is hereby repealed and in place thereof the following section shall have effect:—

Repeal of Law 2 of 1905 Second Schedule sec. 21 and substitution of new section.

21. Every public officer who, having held a pensionable office in Cyprus for a period of at least twelve months, leaves the service of Cyprus for the service of any Colony or Protectorate, or for service under the Imperial Government, or is transferred with the approval of the High Commissioner to other employment in Cyprus of a quasi-public character, and whose aggregate service would have entitled him, had it been wholly in Cyprus, to a pension under these Regulations, shall, on his ultimate retirement from service, be entitled to a pension at the rate of one-seven hundred and twentieth ($\frac{1}{720}$) of the amount of his annual salary at the date of his leaving the service of Cyprus as aforesaid, for each month of his service in Cyprus; and in calculating such service in Cyprus, an addition proportionate to his total public service may be made in respect of the grant, if any, allowable under section 19 hereof; provided also that no addition shall be made which, together with the number of years of actual service, shall amount to more than forty years.

Rights of officers transferred from Cyprus to any Colony or Protectorate for the service of the Imperial Government.

3. The provisions of this Law shall apply to all public officers now or hereafter serving in Cyprus, and to those

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who having so served have been transferred to public service elsewhere, but shall not affect the pensions granted to any persons who have retired from the public service before the coming into operation of this Law.

This Law was published in the Cyprus Gazette No. 1668 of the 2nd January, 1925.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is necessary to make provision for such expenses of the Government of Cyprus for the year ending the thirty-first day of December, 1925, as are not already lawfully provided for or shall not hereafter be provided for by any Law.

Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Appropriation Law, 1925.

Appropriation of £497,305.

2. In addition to the sums already lawfully appropriated to the service of the King or which may be hereafter lawfully appropriated thereto, there shall be issued and applied to the service of the twelve months ending the thirty-first day of December, 1925, any sum not exceeding the sum of Four Hundred and Ninety-Seven Thousand Three Hundred and Five Pounds for defraying the charge of the Government of Cyprus for such period.

Limitation of the sum to be spent on Personal Emoluments.

3. A sum not exceeding the amount set down under each head in the Schedule hereto may be issued and spent in respect of the Establishment or Service specified and referred to therein; provided that the total sum spent on Personal Emoluments during the year, appropriated under this Law, shall not exceed the sum of Two Hundred and Sixty Thousand Eight Hundred and Eleven Pounds.
